a. Resolution No. 2009-02

Chief Pavone informed the Board that the District must update its resolution annually to participate in the Fire Mitigation Fee Fund program administered by the County of San Diego. He reported that the fee set by the County of San Diego Board of Supervisors would remain the same for next fiscal year, 46 cents per square foot for new construction.

Chief Pavone informed the Board that this resolution required by the County of San Diego must be renewed annually. If adopted, the special tax remains at \$2.50 per benefit unit for FY 10.

7. New Business

a. Agreement for Professional Services

Ms. Rannals summarized the staff report provided. She reported that the County of San Diego has been processing the special tax assessments for the annual property tax roll for over 25 years. Since receiving notification that they will not be collecting, she has been attending meetings with other fire districts within the county to determine a qualified vendor to provide the services. The proposed contract between Willdan Financial Services and the District for Special Tax Administration is for three years, with two (2) one (1) year options to renew. Staff responded to questions from the Board.

b. Budget Authorization

Chief Michel summarized the staff report provided. He reported that the FY09 Capital Budget included the planned purchase of replacement Thermal Imaging Cameras. The cameras to be purchased are the Bullard T320 at a cost of \$11,201.25 per unit. The current cameras, (Draegers), are over fourteen (14 yrs) old, heavy, large and use outdated technology. Due to the increase in California sales tax, the cost for the cameras went from \$20,000.00 to 22,402.50.

MOTION BY DIRECTOR HICKERSON, SECOND BY DIRECTOR HILLGREN, CARRIED 5 AYES; 0 NOES; 0 to authorize the purchase of two thermal imaging cameras and fund the expenditure from the general fund.

c. Ad Hoc Committee Appointment – Audit

Ms. Rannals informed the Board that the audit firm has scheduled their first meeting with staff on May 21. She requested that the Board President appoint an ad hoc committee to meet with staff and the independent auditor to begin the FY09 financial audit.

President Ashcraft appointed Directors Malin and Tanner to the ad hoc committee for the FY09 financial audit.

d. LAFCO 2009 Special Districts Election

Chief Pavone informed the Board members that to elect representatives to the LAFCO Committee and Special District Advisory Committee, the District must authorize a board member to cast the ballot. He requested that the Board of Directors authorize the Board President to cast the ballot on behalf of the Fire District

Pursuant to Government Code §7901, special districts may annually choose one of the following by a recorded vote of the governing body:

1. Cost of Living:

- a. the change in California per capita personal income; or
- b. the percentage change in the jurisdiction's assessed valuation, which is attributable to nonresidential new construction.

2. Population:

- a. the change in population within the county;
- b. the change in population within the unincorporated area of the county;
- c. the use of specific formula calculations or estimates, permitted for mixed incorporated/unincorporated areas of special districts and/or special districts serving more than one county; or

Each year special districts should perform necessary calculations to determine if year-end proceeds of taxes subject to the limit have exceeded the limit. Preliminary calculations have been made for all revenue received to determine whether this district complies with the appropriations limits established for the current fiscal year. Preliminary calculations show that the district will comply with the appropriation limit.

The following recommendation is submitted for your consideration and/or action:

- 1. To select the change in California per capital personal income (.62%) for the Cost of Living Factor and the change in population within the fire protection district (1.32%). (A copy of the State of California Department of Finance Price & Population Data for Local Jurisdictions and SANDAG is provided).
- 2. The Board may choose to submit population documentation to State Department of Finance Demographic Research Unit for certification by June 1, 2009. Note: there may be a charge by the State for this option. If this option is selected, the District can modify the Gann Limit after supporting documentation is received from the Department of Finance.

Subject: Price and Population Information

Appropriations Limit

The California Revenue and Taxation Code, Section 2227, mandates the Department of Finance (Finance) to transmit an estimate of the percentage change in population to local governments. Each local jurisdiction must use their percentage change in population factor for January 1, 2009, in conjunction with a change in the cost of living, or price factor, to calculate their appropriations limit for fiscal year 2009-2010. Enclosure I provides the change in California's per capita personal income and an example for utilizing the price factor and population percentage change factor to calculate the 2009-2010 appropriations limit. Enclosure II provides city and unincorporated county population percentage changes, and Enclosure IIA provides county and incorporated areas summed population percentage changes. The population percentage change data excludes federal and state institutionalized populations and military populations.

Population Percent Change for Special Districts

Some special districts must establish an annual appropriations limit. Consult the Revenue and Taxation Code, Section 2228, for further information regarding the appropriation limit. You can access the Code from the following website: "http://www.leginfo.ca.gov/calaw.html" check box: "Revenue and Taxation Code" and enter 2228 for the search term to learn more about the various population change factors available to special districts to calculate their appropriations limit. Article XIII B, Section 9(C), of the State Constitution exempts certain special districts from the appropriations limit calculation mandate. Consult the following website: "http://www.leginfo.ca.gov/.const/.article_13B" for additional information. Special districts required by law to calculate their appropriations limit must present the calculation as part of their annual audit. Any questions special districts have on this issue should be referred to their respective county for clarification, or to their legal representation, or to the law itself. No state agency reviews the local appropriations limits.

Population Certification

The population certification program applies only to cities and counties. Revenue and Taxation Code Section 11005.6 mandates Finance to automatically certify any population estimate that exceeds the current certified population with the State Controller's Office. **Finance will certify the higher estimate to the State Controller by June 1, 2009**.

Please Note: Prior year's city population estimates may be revised.

A. **Price Factor**: Article XIII B specifies that local jurisdictions select their cost-of-living factor to compute their appropriation limit by a vote of their governing body. The cost-of-living factor provided here is per capita personal income. If the percentage change in per capita personal income is selected, the percentage change to be used in setting the 2009-2010 appropriation limit is:

Per Capita Personal Income

Fiscal Year (FY)	Percentage change over prior year

B. Following is an example using sample population change and the change in California per capita personal income as growth factors in computing a 2009-2010 appropriation limit.

2009-2010:

Per Capita Cost of Living Change = 0.62 percent Population Change = 1.11 percent

Per Capita Cost of Living converted to a ratio: 0.62 + 100 = 1.0062

Population converted to a ratio: $\frac{1.11 + 100}{100} = 1.0111$

Calculation of factor for FY 2009-2010:

 $1.0062 \times 1.0111 = 1.0174$

BACKGROUND

The Board of Directors adopted the District's first Strategic Plan in February 2005. In October 2006, a new committee was formed with representation from all departments within the District. The Strategic Planning committee worked together for many months to review and update the plan. The board adopted the new plan in September 2007.

CURRENT SITUATION

The 2007 plan was scaled down from the 2005 plan, although it contained approximately 60 items. These items were identified to be District priorities at the time of the plan adoption. As with any plan, numerous items have evolved since the adoption of the plan. The status of the 2007 approved plan is as follows (See attached detail):

Of the four items that have not been started, three items are from the heading of "An Organization that Works as a Team with the Communities and Customers it Serves." These items would be easier to address once there is further build-out and more information on community demographics. The fourth item is the recruitment of the additional admin staff position. This position has been on hold until the parking/office space issues are resolved.

As mentioned above, there are always additional items that present themselves that require a shift in priorities. The following is a list of the many items that have required staff to re-direct priorities and focus time and resources to deal with these items:
