#### High winds cause big trouble for firefighters in two brush fires

SAN DIEGO (CBS 8/CNS) – A possible arson fire scorched about 12 open acres in the Black Mountain Ranch area Wednesday amid dry, breezy weather conditions, authorities reported.

The non-injury blaze erupted in a hilly area off Camino del Sur and San Dieguito Road shortly before 9 a.m., according to the San Diego Fire-Rescue Department.

It took about 60 firefighters and crews aboard two helicopters about an hour to fully extinguish the flames, which never threatened any structures, SDFRD

spokesman Maurice Luque said. The nearest homes were about a quarter-mile from the burn area, and mostly upwind of it, he said.

Dry Santa Ana gusts up to about 30 mph stoked the fire, according to Luque.

"Those winds did push the fire ahead of our crews. Our crews did catch up with it. We had the luxury of having two helicopters available," San Diego Fire-Rescue spokesperson Maurice Luque said.

The cause of the blaze was under investigation. A witness reported seeing a man attempting to stomp out a small fire, then flee when it started to spread.

Meanwhile, a brush fire that was burning near Harrah's Rincon Casino in Valley Center Wednesday morning has been knocked down after burning under an acre. The fire began at around 6 a.m. when and was sparked by a downed power line

According to Cal Fire Battalion Chief Nick Schuler, fire crews were lucky to stop the spread of the blaze in the area, which has seen much larger, more destructive fires in the past.

"This is an area where we've seen very large, devastating fires. We were very fortunate that we were able to stop this fire at just a quarter-acre," Cal Fire Battalion Chief Nick Schuler said.

Gusting Santa Ana winds fueled brush fires Wednesday, including a 600-acre blaze in a largely uninhabited area near Tecate that sent smoke over parts of San Diego County and caused ash to fall in Chula Vista, National City and Imperial Beach.

Cal Fire stationed crews at the Otay Mesa Port of Entry in case the fire spread across the border from Mexico and were ready to help Mexican firefighters if needed. Fire officials in Mexico asked for Cal Fire's assistance in the afternoon but later canceled the request.

#### Update

Cal Fire officials said Thursday that while they continue to monitor the fire burning in Tecate its threat has diminished because the winds have died down. The fire has not crossed into the United States

The fire was still burning at sundown, with Mexican fire officials not saying when it would be contained.

Firefighters in San Diego County, meanwhile, managed to contain two small brush fires. The largest burned 12 acres in the Black Mountain Ranch area at the northern reaches of San Diego. The city's firefighters kept it from reaching homes that were about a half mile away.

Cal Fire responded to two small blazes in the county, one a rubbish fire in Dulzura and the other a one-acre brush fire near Harrah's Rincon casino in Valley Center.

"We dodged a bullet," Cal Fire Capt. Michael Mohler said, given the winds and low humidity. He said crews were on high alert, and Cal Fire will retain extra staffing Thursday.

A red-flag warning issued by the National Weather Service was in effect until 9 p.m. Wednesday in the county. The warnings are made when sustained winds of at least 25 mph or frequent gusts of 35 mph occur, combined with 15 percent or lower humidity over at least six hours.

Wind gusts as high as 50 mph were reported Wednesday in parts of East and North County. Winds were expected to diminish overnight. Light rain is forecast Thursday night and Friday, with up to a quarter-inch possible along the coast and a half-inch in the valleys and foothills.

The National Weather Service said the snow level may drop to 3,500 feet, with light snow possible atop Palomar Mountain.

#### **Tecate fire**

On Wednesday, South County residents said smoke from the fire in Mexico was thick at times, and some reported eye and throat irritation and difficulty breathing. By early evening, residents as far north as La Jolla reported smelling smoke.

Imperial Beach resident Chris Morrow, who lives near the Tijuana Estuary, closed all of her condo windows and kept her two dogs inside. She went outside to take some video of the fire, but said it was "difficult to breathe." She said some people outside were holding cloths over their faces.

The fire in Mexico began shortly after 10 a.m. about two miles south of the border in the area of Valle Redondo, south of the toll road between Tijuana and Tecate, said Carlos Carreno, spokesman for the Tijuana Fire Department.

Alfredo Escobedo, Baja California's civil protection chief, said firefighters were trying to protect some rural cabins. The mountainous area is difficult to access, he said.

"The mountain is high, the firefighters can't climb it, and winds make it dangerous to use a helicopter," Escobedo said.

A tall, brown column of smoke from the blaze was visible by late morning

from Lemon Grove and Rancho San Diego. By the afternoon, smoke had drifted north, causing a brown haze in Mission Valley. Cal Fire said that some people erroneously thought the fire was on the south slope of San Miguel Mountain, southeast of Spring Valley.

In eastern Tijuana, residents of Ejido Francisco Villa watched as a huge cloud of smoke rose on the other side of the mountain around midday. Fire authorities said no residences were immediately threatened, but the head of the city's General Hospital urged anyone with respiratory difficulties or nausea from the smoke to seek immediate medical attention.

#### San Diego County fires

Because of the potentially dangerous weather conditions, San Diego firefighters made an aggressive attack on the Black Mountain blaze when it started about 8:45 a.m., tackling it "with everything we've got," said Maurice Luque, spokesman for the San Diego Fire-Rescue Department.

No cause had been determined, but it may have been deliberately set, Luque said.

He said witnesses reported seeing a man near where the blaze started, but investigators questioned him and determined he was not involved.

The fire began in a dry canyon west of Camino del Sur near Paseo del Sur. Winds of 20 to 30 mph pushed flames across sparse vegetation crisscrossed by walking and biking trails. The winds blew the flames generally away from houses, many of them new and some still under construction.

About 60 firefighters battled the blaze, along with two firefighting helicopters that drew water from a nearby golf course pond. Most of the flames were out by about 10 a.m. Cal Fire sent a hand crew to help with mopping up the smoldering fire.

"Things were dry out there, and we had the wind and the low humidity," Luque said. "These kinds of days are a heightened concern. We're very fortunate we didn't have a lot of fires."

Lisa Vitale and Kim Zupnik, who both live in the neighborhood, had watched from afar as a fire helicopter dumped water in a canyon.

"They took care of it before it became a major catastrophe," Zupnik said.

Vitale agreed. "I'm impressed at how quickly they jumped on it and took care of if," she said.

The fire in Valley Center near Harrah's Rincon casino was sparked shortly after 6 a.m. when winds snapped a tree branch that fell onto power lines, Mohler said. The blaze near West Tribal Road and Valley Center Road was quickly contained. The federal government maintains the power lines, Mohler said.

The Dulzura fire was first reported as a house fire but turned out to be burning pile of rubbish, Mohler said. It was reported about 3:15 p.m. Cal Fire had it quickly under control, before it could reach the house or surrounding vegetation.

#### **Southern California fires**

A 2-acre blaze driven by Santa Ana winds also damaged several structures in the Glen Avon area near Riverside. One home was heavily damaged and two other structures had moderate damage, said Jody Hagemann, a Cal Fire spokeswoman.

Three people were taken to a hospital for minor smoke inhalation. The fire appeared to have started near a freeway, swept across a plowed field and among adjacent homes. Authorities said power lines were down in the area, but the cause of the blaze remained under investigation.

In Orange County, a brush fire burned 5 acres in a hilly unincorporated territory near Brea before it was contained.

# Safety features highlight new fire station in Fairbanks Ranch

A new fire station under construction in Fairbanks lanch will be one of the safest buildings in the community lue to strict earthquake standards imposed by the state.

The new station at 6424 El Apajo will replace the Ranho Santa Fe Fire District's former Station No. 3, which was lemolished last year. During construction, the area is being erved from a temporary station housed in trailers across the treet.

Construction on the new station began in June 2010, and district officials expect to open the new station in December or January.

The new, nearly 11,000-square-foot station replaces a 3,000-square-foot-facilty built in 1983. In 1986, California idopted the Essential Services Buildings Seismic Safety Act, which requires that public safety buildings such as fire stations be built 125 percent stronger than non-safety buildings, said Rancho Santa Fe fire Capt. Chris Galindo, project nanager for the new fire station.

Because the new station is in a flood zone, construction crews had to put in 192 columns made of compressed rock, three feet each in diameter and 40 feet tall, to stabilize the See STATION, page 18

continued from page 1 ground beneath the building, said Galindo.

"You definitely want that in time of emergency to make sure our apparatus can get out (of the building)," said Rancho Santa Fe Fire Chief Tony Michel.

The new station also includes an emergency generator and diesel fuel tanks, to ensure that the station and its fire trucks can function in an earthquake or other disaster, Michel said.

Jim Ashcraft, president of the fire district's board of directors, estimated that with all contingencies included, the total cost of the new station will be about \$4.7 million.

Michel and Ashcraft said 75 percent of the money for the station will come from fees charged to developers for projects within the district, while the remaining 25 percent will come from the district's general fund, generated primarily from property tax revenue.

The building was designed to fit in with the surrounding community, said Michel, and includes cut stone on its outer façade, along with ornamentation that appears to be made of painted wood but is in fact lightweight foam.

While he has heard some comments about the size of the building, Michel

said the new station was designed as a two-story structure so that fire trucks and ambulances can exit and enter safely and efficiently.

Because the old station had only one driveway for entry and exit, firefighters had to stop traffic on El Apajo and back the fire trucks into the station each time they returned from a call. The new building has two driveways, so trucks can pull into the building and out again, without having to shift into reverse.

Living quarters, a kitchen, dining room and a workout area were built on the second floor, above the apparatus bay where the rigs are
kept. The new station will
have one old-fashioned component—a brass fire pole
will be installed, so firefighters can quickly drop down
from their living quarters to

the equipment bay when they get an emergency call.

"Everything's about response time. In the case of a stroke, every second is important," Ashcraft said.

In order to expand the footprint of the old station, the district purchased a halfacre of land from a next-door neighbor to bring the entire parcel to .83 of an acre, said Galindo.

The old fire station was not only built before the current state earthquake standards were enacted, but it had numerous problems such as dry rot and termite infestation, officials said, which made it more cost-effective to tear it down and build a new station.

Initially, the station will house a three-person engine company, which includes three three-person crews. The station has room to bring in an additional truck, or possibly an ambulance, Michel said.

With the new station on line, the district will have four fire stations in operation to cover its 38-square-mile territory, which includes Rancho Santa Fe, Fairbanks Ranch, 4S Ranch, The Crosby, Cielo and other communities.

With the completion of the new station, the district now has all of its physical structures in place to serve its population of 28,000 residents for the next 50 to 60 years, and the district won't face any new capital costs for "a long time," Ashcraft said.

The suspect reportedly took keys assigned to one of the station's ambulances as well as an ambulance pager.


"We are taking this incident very seriously," said Battalion Chief Mike Gibbs. "The safety of the community and our personnel is our priority."

We are cooperating fully with the San Diego County Sheriff's Department as they continue to investigate the incident and will do everything we can to prevent this from occurring in the future."

The ambulance keys were located and the incident is still being investigated, said sheriff's spokeswoman Melissa Aquino on Monday.

### Job market woes extend to next generation

COAST CITIES — A troubling effect of the Great Recession is its impact on young workers. From April to July, the number of employed youth, ages 16 to 24, rose by 1.7 million to 18.6 million, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. The share of young people employed in July was 48.8 percent, the lowest for July on record since statistics began in 1948.

Youth unemployment has become a hot button issue because of long-term consequences that can include loss of job readiness and skills, idleness and feelings of hopelessness that can lead to poverty and crime. Many young people feel the American Dream is beyond their reach.

North County high schools are working with employers to put students to work.

Laura Bunzli is a career guidance tech at El Camino High School in Oceanside.

"If an employer calls and gives me the position and contact info, I post it in the career center and put it in the daily bulletin that announces school happenings," she said. "Students can come into the career center and find out who's hiring. I'll give them a printed sheet with contact info. I also have websites where they can look themselves."

Other high schools including Torrey Pines offer work experience and internship programs with employers such Starbucks, the Golden Spoon, Flower Hill Flowers and Scripps Hospital.

Debra Brody is the WorkAbility coordinator for the San Dieguito Union High School District. The state-funded program provides pre-employment skills training, worksite training and follow-up services for youth (ages 12 to 22) in special education who are making the transition from school to work. This group includes those with developmental disabilities, autism, attention deficit disorder, dyslexia and vision and hearing deficits.

Brody reports that the economy has impacted her program.

"Most jobs traditionally filled by high school students are being filled by experienced adults," she said. "Fast food restaurants are somewhat the exception, although jobs for teens under 18 are extremely hard to find."

Brody said she's had the best results with fast food restaurants and some grocery stores.

"If teens need money, the quickest way is babysitting, dog walking and doing odd jobs," she added. "Meanwhile, they should volunteer because it beefs up the resume."

Local businesses that have stepped up to the plate include Hansen's Surf Shop, Detour Salon, Dogs & Suds, Scripps Hospital and LegoLand.

West Inn and Suites has participated in the WorkAbility program for three years, pairing employees with staff under the direction of Carl Holmes, housekeeping manager. A year ago Holmes was recognized for his leadership by the U.S. Congress and California State Senate.

Participants such as Danny Arellano have thrived under Holmes' guidance, advancing to permanent positions after the completion of subsidized training.

"We love these kids," said Kimberly Akers, vice president of hospitality. "They are a real part of the team. They are never late and have a real willingness to serve. Danny has an eye for detail and has been cross-trained."

Danny says the best part of the job is getting a paycheck and meeting people.

"My parents are proud of me," he said. "That feels good."

Blaze Newman is a teacher and school site coordinator of the Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID) Program for the San Dieguito Union High School District. The program is targeted to students who don't traditionally go on to college.

Newman just launched a job shadowing program, linking students with professionals.

"One student thought he wanted to be a veterinarian," she said. "After shadowing Dr. Milton Gee for a day he has a more tangible vision of what the job entails. At the end of the day he said, 'We spayed two dogs!' He felt connected and involved."

Newman says another senior worked a 24-hour shift with an engineer with the Rancho Santa Fe Fire Department.

A computer game designer, pharmaceutical sales representative, CEO, elementary school teacher, nurse practitioner and neo-natal hospital nurse have also signed up to serve as hosts.

"This is a start-up program that is going to expand significantly this year and I would love to hear from anyone interested in hosting a student," Newman said. "I am looking for professionals working mostly in jobs that require four-year degrees."

The fire briefly threatened a sewer treatment plant, Taber said.


She said it took firefighters about 30 minutes to extinguish the blaze.


No structures were damaged and no one was hurt, Taber said.

## Rancho Santa Fe firefighters respond to vegetation fire in 4S Ranch

On Nov. 9, at 4:30 p.m., firefighters from the Rancho Santa Fe Fire Protection District (RSFFPD), along with firefighters from the city of San Diego, Enicintas, and Cal-Fire, responded to a reported vegetation fire near Old Course Road and Maranatha Drive in 4S Ranch. 
